Frequently asked questions

Do members and guests need to sign in at every chapter/club event?

Yes. This information helps us calculate the reimbursement for each attendee. The exception to this rule is Matching Fund events that include community members and public officials. For these, only members and their personally invited guests have to sign in. For an easier way to keep track of attendees, try the Attendance App on imakeanimpact.org. (Learn more on Page 9.)

How do I report my activity if my chapter/club worked with another chapter/club?

When you collaborate with other chapters or youth service clubs, write on the receipts that you submit with your reports which chapters or youth clubs were involved.

Who can attend chapter/club activities, and who is considered a "quest?"

Chapter and youth service club activities are for members only. Members can invite guests to accompany them to events, but repeat guests should consider membership if they plan to continue attending. The general public should not be invited to events – except for Matching Fund fundraisers, where community members may be invited.








Share this great benefit

What's your favorite fraternal memory?

It's hard to choose! My three favorites so far: (1) A Hometown Hero event we held in August 2018. We honored Bernita Preston, a humble 91-year-old lady who has served people all her life, most recently through the prison ministry of a local correctional facility. (2) A Matching Fund event in June 2018 where we raised a total of \$1,350.30. The event was a garage sale, and both the funds raised and items not sold were donated to the Topeka Rescue Mission. (3) Our Harvey House Girls educational event. (Editor's note: Read about this event on the next page!)

What inspires your activity planning?

I'm a people person. I love interacting with people I know and people I don't know. So I plan events to get people involved.

What's your biggest challenge?

I like to plan interesting events to reach new members while also appealing to our regular attendees. Sometimes events have an attendee minimum, so I work hard to reach that.

What do you do in your free time?

Volunteer and spend time with family, especially my grandkids. In addition to being an activities coordinator, I facilitate a women's Bible study group and monthly ministry at a care home. I also love music, being outdoors and learning new things.

What's your personal motto?

I can do all things through Christ who gives me strength.

What would people be most surprised to learn about you?

I'm a people person ... but I love having quiet time alone.

Explore a

local treasure

Summit chapter activities coordinator Barb Altman was always impressed by the majestic Great Overland Station in Topeka, Kansas.

When she learned that the historic station holds tours and luncheons inspired by the Harvey House Girls (servers at Harvey House restaurants, which were stationed along the Santa Fe Railroad line from the 1880s through the 1950s), she suggested the event to her members.

Setting the stage

"Our premier status funds paid for everyone's meals," explains Barb. "The presenters dressed in Harvey House and depot agent attire, gave a history lesson of the Great Overland Station and Harvey House Girls, and offered a tour of the beautifully restored railroad station." Barb was able to find upcoming luncheon dates by checking the station's website and working with the staff. The station requires a minimum of 25 attendees to plan the luncheon, so getting members interested was crucial.

Destination: Fun

After the event, Barb got great feedback from her members – and to this day, it's one of her top three favorite fraternal events.

"We gained a greater knowledge of the history of the railroads and Harvey House Girls – and the station was able to reach possible donors."

Barb and her Summit chapter enjoy lunch and a tour at a historic railroad station and museum in Topeka.

SERVICE PROJECT SPOTLIGHT: Youth clubs and seniors

Get inspired by these creative, impactful projects planned by your fellow fraternal leaders.

DOUGLASVILLE, GEORGIA

Young members plant a garden

After learning that the local senior center has a garden club, Terry Henley gathered youth club members to help. The group brainstormed with the residents, then worked together to plant the vegetables.

HOW TO: Terry began by meeting with the residents and the center's activities coordinator to decide which vegetables to plant. Then they visited the local garden center to narrow the list down to vegetables that were in season. They purchased their supplies, picked a day in April that worked for the club and the residents, and planted the garden.

WHAT WORKED: Working with the right people – the center's activities coordinator and the garden center staff – from the beginning helped keep the group on the right track. It was also helpful to plan a project for a group Terry's youth club was familiar with; they had done other projects for seniors before, so the youth club members understood the impact of their efforts.

NEXT TIME: Terry plans to adapt the project idea for other groups, and the youth club is currently planning a gardening project for adults with special needs. Next time, the group hopes to include more adult members to make the workload a bit lighter and easier.

FARGO, NORTH DAKOTA

Club delivers songs and smiles

Mackenzie Hamm's youth service club has done a number of events for nursing homes – like ice cream socials, Bingo tournaments and talent shows. This time, they planned something simple and sweet: the kids made cards for nursing home residents, then hand-delivered them and sang songs.

HOW TO: Mackenzie worked with the nursing home to find a day and time that worked for the residents. The group then prepared for the event by buying and customizing cards and practicing the songs they planned to sing.

WHAT WORKED: The youth club took time to visit each room separately, which made each resident feel special and appreciated. And the adults in the youth club took time to explain the event to the young members. "We talked to the children about how special their interactions with the residents are – and we prepared them for unique situations, such as meeting a resident who can't hear or speak well, or talking to someone with Alzheimer's, which helped keep the kids from feeling nervous."

NEXT TIME: After this event, Mackenzie says, the kids act less shy around adults and seniors, which leaves lots of opportunities for more one-on-one interactions in the future. Mackenzie would dedicate a little more time to the event next time so the group doesn't feel rushed toward the end of their visit.

Leave an impression

Tips for planning a memorable service project

Service projects are meant to be hands-on experiences for members. The goal: Bring them together to make a difference in their community.

To hold a successful service project ...

- Communicate the activity so members have all the information they need. (See Page 10 for tips on this).
- 2. **Build excitement** so members want to participate.
- Leave a lasting impression so members want to participate in the next one. (Bonus: They'll tell others how great the experience was, which will bring more attendees to your event.)

To BUILD EXCITEMENT, you need ...

- Variety. Keep your service projects fresh and different, rather than doing the same thing each month.
- Feedback. Ask for input, and listen to what members want to do.
- A twist. Make your activity unique.

To LEAVE A LASTING IMPRESSION,

- Hands-on. Get members directly involved with the people and causes they're helping. Some ideas: volunteer for a mobile food pantry, or hold infants in the NICU at a local hospital.
- Insightful. Schedule a speaker to talk about the organization or cause your members are supporting, or arrange a tour of the organization.
- Personal. Find and share a story that relates to the project and shows why your efforts are important. For example, if your members are helping an organization that benefits children with special needs, and one of your members has benefitted from that organization, ask him/her to share their story with the group.

Web app brings attendance sheets online

Did you know you can track member and guest attendance electronically at your events? It's easy! All you need is a mobile device and internet access.

Perks:

- No more printing, saving and scanning paper forms.
- Use the tool at your event and you don't have to include attendance sheets in your report.
- Easily track attendance to see who has come to your events.
- Measure which events are most popular and which attract different members.
- Access attendance logs to plan future events that attract a variety of members.

Get started:

- Access the Attendance App in the top drop-down menu on imakeanimpact.org.
- Bring a mobile device or tablet with internet capability to your next event, and use it to access the tool.
- Try it at least twice! The first time may take longer, since you'll need to add members and guests to your records. But their information will be saved for quick, easy entry at the next event.



Aug. 26: National Dog Day

Fundraiser for your furry friends

Project type: Matching Fund

Gather members to make matching friendship collars and bracelets (for the pooch and pet parent, respectively) to sell to the community. Below is a step-by-step crafting guide adapted from The Broke Dog. Check Pinterest for more ideas.

Materials needed:

Dog collar (any size)
Smaller dog collar (for wrist)
Embroidery floss in different colors
Glue
Chalk pencil or marker
Ruler

Step 1: Plan your pattern

Test out the pattern by wrapping the embroidery floss around the collars, creating stripes in the color order you'd like. Use the pencil or marker to mark where the color changes.

Step 2: Glue and wrap

Use a dab of glue to attach the end of the embroidery floss onto one collar, then wrap the floss around the collar. When you're done with one color of embroidery floss, cut the floss and dab glue on the other end.

Step 3: Repeat

Repeat the pattern on the other collar so the two match. Wait for the glue to try, then wear – or sell!

Laugh it off


Project type: Service

Bring smiles to a local assisted living facility with a day of fun! Gather members to organize a comedy or talent show for residents, and/or bring activities and games to the residents. (Some ideas: tabletop bowling, a beanbag toss, puzzles or cup stacking)

For extra impact, collect donations like socks, hygiene products and sugar-free candies from members and the community in advance, then give them away as prizes during your day of fun. Work with the assisted living facility staff to determine what types of donations the residents need and coordinate the comedy/talent show and activities.

Step by step:

- Decide on the type of event comedy or talent show, games and activities, or a combination of the two.
- 2. Gather member volunteers to organize and run the event.
- 3. Contact the assisted living facility's activities coordinator to finalize details.
- Gather supplies and donations. Practice together for the show, if needed.
- 5. On the day of the event, get everything set up and have fun!
