

A recent youth service club project is bringing comfort to families facing the death of a pet.

"We unfortunately got the idea after my dog got hit by a car, and we had to use the animal ER," says Mackenzie Hamm, leader of the Fargo, North Dakota, club.

Club members realized how sad it was to put a dog to sleep. They wanted to think of something special they could give these grieving families.

The kids wrote sympathy cards and painted wooden picture frames the hospital could give to families as a remembrance. Club members and their parents also shopped online for a variety of items the animal hospital said were needed, such as:

- · Laminating paper for pictures and footprints.
- Washcloths to clean up animals from accidents and after surgery.
- Blankets to bring comfort to the animals (and families) during final goodbyes.

Mackenzie dropped off the donations on behalf of the club.

"The children all felt so good to know they were bringing comfort to another family mourning the loss of a pet," says Mackenzie. "Everyone in our group has had to use the ER for a pet, so they felt this was a very deserving organization."

Mackenzie's family lost a second dog just a week after the club completed this project. When ER staff brought the dog into the room, the kids were comforted to see their pet wrapped in a blanket they had just donated.

Kevin offered a plethora of simple, yet effective methods that everyday people can incorporate into their daily lives to train their pets. One family planned to use the training information for their Jack Russell terrier.

"A tip I would suggest is to use a local trainer," says Karly Vittetoe, another Tennessee chapter activities coordinator who took part in this event. "Events like these can greatly improve the business of a local trainer and can provide a good point of contact for attendees who are further interested in their services."

Honor essential workers in March

It's been one year since the pandemic started changing life as we know it in the U.S. Let's all **honor essential workers as Hometown Heroes** for their commitment and sacrifice.

When? Week of March 14-20.

What? Provide members with yard signs to stake in the lawns of family members and friends who are essential workers. You can also order and distribute Everyday Hero pins to Modern Woodmen members who are essential workers.

How?

Request it!

Enter your activity request (by Jan. 31 is recommended, but no later than Feb. 14).

- Name of event: Honoring essential workers.
- Date: 3/14/20.
- Multiple days question: Select "yes" and enter 3/20/21 as the end date. Check "I would like to enter my own time." Add "Place signs by 3/20."
- **Recipient category:** Special campaign.
- Recipient name: Essential workers.
- Need a Hometown Hero certificate: Select "no."
- **RSVP option:** Use this option, found under postcard invitations. We recommend an RSVP deadline no later than Feb. 28.
- Additional information for invitations: "Place Modern Woodmen thank-you yard signs on the lawns of essential workers you know. RSVP with the number of yard signs needed."



Host it!

- Track the number of signs members request via RSVP.
- Order the number of signs needed in the Supplies area. Allow at least 10 days for processing and shipping.
- Work with a Modern Woodmen financial representative to identify members who are also essential workers. Order Everyday Hero pins for those members.
- Arrange drop-off to members who requested signs once you receive them. (One thank-you postcard will be included for each sign.) Remind members to place signs in yards beginning March 14, but no later than March 20.
- Give the pins to members you've identified as essential workers.
- Share the media release and social media posts. Encourage members to post on social media as well.

Report it!

- Use RSVP tracking for attendance numbers. Add this information to the new Fraternal Connect app (coming soon, see Page 7), or upload a copy of your RSVP tracking sheet in the sign-in sheet
- Include expenses in the cost area if your chapter incurred expenses beyond the signs. Attach receipts in the receipt area.
 Youth clubs should include the cost of signs in the total cost of the event.

Win it.

 Submit your report no later than April 20 to be entered into a drawing for a \$500 travel gift card! (Three winners will be drawn in May.)


2021 activity guideline highlights

- Chapters and youth service clubs can continue to host all available activity categories.
- Postcards are still required for all chapter events, except service projects.
 For youth clubs, Matching Fund projects require postcards. Activity requests must be submitted at least 28 days in advance of the event.
- Virtual (online) events are allowed and encouraged. The approved virtual meeting tools are Zoom and certain features available in a closed Facebook group.
- No-contact and limited-contact events, such as drop-off or drive-thru events, are allowed for all activity categories. (Guidelines vary by category.)
- Tracking attendance is required for all fraternal activities, including virtual events.

Coming to your favorite app store in early February



Fraternal Connect is Modern Woodmen's first mobile app **created just for Modern Woodmen fraternal leaders**.

The free application for smartphones and tablets helps you track attendance in a more convenient, reliable way. It also:

- · Is easy to use.
- Has offline capability. (Check in attendees even if you don't have internet service at the event).
- Helps you report attendance accurately.
- Helps you analyze who's attending events.
- Filter your roster to know which attendees are guests vs. members.
- More easily determine which types of activities attract which types of members.
- Know how many unique members you're engaging throughout the year.
- Is easily accessible from a web browser if you don't have access to a tablet or smartphone.

What information do I need when requesting and reporting events this year?

A

Please tell us:

- What tools you're using. The approved virtual meeting tools are Zoom and certain features available in a closed Facebook group.
- How you plan to limit contact and have member households participate. No-contact or limited-contact events, such as drop-off or drive-by events, are allowed for all activity categories.
- Who/how many attended. Tracking attendance is still required for all fraternal activities, including virtual events.

Also, remember **postcards are required** for all chapter events, except service projects. For youth clubs, Matching Fund projects require postcards. That means activity requests must be submitted at least 28 days in advance of the event. Include all the details members will need to participate in activities:

- How can members donate to an online fundraiser?
- Are there costs involved for a social event?
- Where do members find the Zoom meeting details?

Do I have to reply to Fraternal each time I receive an email regarding requests and reports?

A

The information provided in those emails will determine your response.

- You may receive a system-generated email reminding you to submit a report or to revise and resubmit a request or report. The email will tell you what we
- need. You don't have to contact us.
- If we have a specific question, we may ask you to reply.

If you have questions regarding any email you receive, please contact us. We'll be happy to help.

I'm feeling overwhelmed. What do you recommend?

A

That's understandable and normal. A lot of changes have taken place over the past year. Remember, there are resources available to help you, and you don't have to learn everything at once. We recommend becoming familiar with the new guidelines first. Then view the resources to help your ideas come to life.

There are also materials available to help your members with the new guidelines, so you don't have to train them yourself. Find how-to documents for members (such as how to join a Zoom meeting or Facebook activity) on the COVID-19 page of the Training Materials site at imakeanimpact.org.

Keeping traditions alive
